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Alegations unresolved

Made against DA a year ago

As former state Sen. roy Hebert and 16th Judicial District Attorney Phil Haney were battling on the public stage of the state Legislature this time last year, it appears another, potentially more serious, scuffle was being waged behind the scenes. Possibly at stake is Haney's license to practice law.



The Daily Iberian filed public records requests with Hebert, Haney and ODC seeking documentation involved in the ODC complaint. Haney responded through First Assistant

dence between himself and ODC for the past year, which included the complaint and exhibits he filed, Haney's response to the complaint, compiled by the law firm Stanley. Reuter, Ross, Thernton and Alford, LLC of New Orleans, and Hebert's

rebuttal to Haney's response.
None of the documents
provided indicated ODC has made any ruling on the complaint. As the com-plainant, Hebert would have received notification of any outcome, according to the Supreme Court rules. The former senator said he has heard nothing of the status of the complaint as

of Friday afternoon. Charles Plattsmelr, chief counsel for ODC, refused to release any information about the investigation, including its status, even

ALLEGATIONS MADE

FOITOR'S NOTE:

Thro years ago, a war between a state senator and the district attorney began over whether a landfill should be allowed to operate just beyond the runtray at the Acadiana Regional triport. What followed were battles that raged in floria and in the Legislature as public allegations of terongdoing, perjury and deert were made. Unknown until a recent publi request, documents reveal that former Sen. Troy Hebert had taken his complaints against 16th Audicial District Attorney Phil Hancy to the the state Supreme Court Office of Disciplinary Counsel a year ago. Below are synopses of the complaints, Hancy's response and Hebert's rebuttal. More are on page .14

Complaint: The Roberts Case

Complaint: The Roberts Case In May 2007 a boating accident at Cypremort Point left a woman in critical condition and the boat driver facing criminal charges. The driver, Shane Roberts, was issued a citation by the state Department of Wildlife and Fisheries for reckless operation of a watercraft. Since the accident occurred within the furisdiction of the 16th Judicial District, Phil Haney's office would have been the entity to prosecute any charges filed against Roberts. However, according to the complaint, Haney petitioned the court on Alig. 8, 2007, to allow him to recuse his office from prosecution. Haney's request was granted by District Judge John Conery, according to the count minutes, which were provided as an exhibit with the complaint. According to the complaint, a letter dated Aug. 30, 2007, was sent by Haney to State Farm and said to contact Haney using the district automey's office said to contact Haney using the district attorney's office telephone number. The letter stated Haney would be representing the victim against Roberts' insurance company.

e state Attorney General was called in after the recusal o prosecute Roberts on additional charges filed against to prosecute Roberts on additional charges filed against him, more serious than the DWF citation. Haney's client settled the claim against the insurance company for more than \$100,000 in December 2007. Roberts went to trial in March 2008.

Harrey's Response

Haney said in his response to Hebert's complaint that he
conducted a conflict check after assuming representation, avoided potential conflict by recusing the district
attorney's office and did not "solicit" a client, despite allegations made to the contrary by former state Sen. Troy Hebert, Haney claimed he had no knowledge of charges filed against the boat driver before assuming representa-tion of the accident victim in her claim with State Farm.

I'lr. Haney took the necessary steps to avoid any conflict and his role as District Attorney by recusing his office from participation in any criminal charges associated with the boating accident and not personally participating in the prosecution of these charges," Haney's reply reads.

Hebert's Rebuttal

Helsert's Rebuttal
Hebert said in a rebuttal to Haney's response that the district attorney "breached his public duty to prosecute a criminal defendant ... so that he could make money on (a) personal injury claim," and misused his "public office for private gain." Hebert said the conflict check should have been conducted before he assumed representation of the boating accident victim and Haney, once the conflict was identified or if even was later identified, Haney was obligated by Supreme Court Rules, case law and a state Bar gated by Supreme Court Rules, case law and a state Bar Association opinion to withdraw from the civil matter.

As a prosecutor, Mr. Haney is given great power and dis-cretion and, as such, he is charged with a higher ethical standard." Hebert's rebuttal reads in addition to calling Haney's actions "unprofessional, unethical and deserving of aggressive prosecution."

It is no wonder that the public believes that there is one set of rules for the powerful (or that lawyers are going to take care of other lawyers) and another set for everyone else," Hebert said.



Complaint: Perjury

Hebert alleges that Haney twice committed perjury during testimony before committees of the state Legislature once in 2009 and again last year. The first incident involves whether the district attorney's office had the approval of the Federal Aviation Administration to enter into a settlement agreement with landfill owner Gordon Doerle in 2008. Haney told legislators they did. Hebert sald the agency has gone on record saying the district attorney's office did not have its approval.

In 2010 Haney testified he did not have a private practice during discussion of private practice habits of assistant district attorney's within the 16th Judicial District. Hebert alleged there is insurmountable evidence to prove that Haney lied.

Haney's Response

Haney said in his reply he did not make any misrepresentations about FAA approval before the committee and that his "statement was supported by information he had received from (Airport Director) Mr. (Jason) Devillier that a person familiar within the FAA ... had considered the terms of the proposed agreement and believed it would likely meet those requirements."

Haney also said Hebert's perjury claim about his private practice is without merit.

Haney said his "statement was an accurate response to the question he believed he was being asked."

"While providing this testimony, which was not under oath, Mr. Haney stated:'I don't have a private practice,' "Haney's reply reads."Mr. Haney did not claim that he has not privately represented clients since becoming district attorney. Rather, his statement was meant to imply that he does not regularly seek to represent private clients and does not maintain a separate office for such pursuits. Mr. Haney does not have a regular and sustained private practice as most lawyers do, even though he may occasionally represent a private client."

Hebert's Rebuttal

Hebert provided ODC with a letter from Devillier, which stated that the airport director never received approval from the FAA and that he never had discussions specific to the settlement agreement with any agency representative.

Hebert repeats in his rebuttal that days after testifying in Baton Rouge that he had no private practice, Haney reported in his annual financial disclosure form income of more than \$100,000 for the previous year from J. Phil Haney, Attorney at Law listed at his home address. Hebert also claimed Haney is listed as the attorney for Cajun Sugar Co-Op, also from his private practice.

"It is unquestionable that Mr. Haney's testimony when coupled with the documentary evidence indicates that the false statements said by Mr. Haney (were) made knowingly," Hebert's complaint reads. "Mr. Haney would have you believe that occasionally representing a private client does not constitute having a private practice. You can't be just a little bit pregnant."

Hebert contends in his rebuttal that Haney "knowingly and materially" made false statements to the legislative committees and suggests, at the minimum, suspension of Haney's license to practice.

Complaint: 'Double Dipping'

During the 2010 Legislative Session, Hebert attempted to limit with legislation an arrangement between assistant district attorneys within the 16th Judicial District and public bodies that he coined "double dipping."

Hebert provided examples in his complaint of cases handled by assistant district attorneys representing Iberia Parish Government through their private practice when the district attorney's office already serves as the legal advisor of the parish.

The parish's Home Rule Charter, Hebert said, provides that a written contract and council approval are necessary for ADAs to represent the parish, a criterion the district attorney's office does not follow, Hebert contends.

Haney's Response

Haney responded that representation of parish government by assistant district attorneys through their private practice has been properly approved through resolutions of the Parish

after he provided a written response that included mention of an exception to the Supreme Court rules that would allow him to do

Plattsmeir said complaints filed with ODC are confidential until the board reaches a conclusion. The results are officially made public if the lawyer in question is publicly reprimanded. The Supreme Court, however, provides an exception to the confidentiality of complaints. If the allegations are generally known to the public, ODC may release information about them. Doing so is at the discretion of Plattsmeir, he said.

Plattsmeir did say the length of time it takes to rule on a complaint varies widely, depending on the complexity of the accusations made.

ODC can choose to dismiss a complaint, issue a private reprimand to the lawyer, suspend a law license or, in the case of serious violations of the court's ethics rules for lawyers, disbar.

Plattsmeir was asked several times to provide the status of the investigation, which he declined.

Hebert's 10-page complaint is subdivided into five parts covering legal representation by Haney from his private practice, allegations of perjury before legislative commit-"double dipping" tees. arrangements with assistant district attorneys and a potential violation of Revised Statute 16:2(f) for collecting more than the \$100,000 Iberia Parish is required to pay its legal advisor.

Hebert brought up many of the issues included in the complaint before the Legislature last year, in many cases seeking to file legislation that would change the way the 16th Judicial District Attorney's Office operates. Only one of Hebert's bills passed the House and Senate which now requires the district attorney's office to post its budget online.

Hebert's Rebuttal

"Mr. Haney, in an April 17, 2006 letter, clearly stated that it is illegal to provide legal services without a written contract and council approval," Hebert replied. "For Mr. Haney to now state ADAs only require a resolution is to allow him to create a double standard for his office and it is a slap in the face to all other lawyers who must conform to the Charter."

Hebert contends in his rebuttal that Haney as the district attorney and legal advisor of Iberia Parish Government should be the one to know, and make "certain that all contracts entered into by and between Iberia Parish Government meet the requirements of the Iberia Parish Home Rule Charter."
